From the Pastor's desk...

It's Superbowl time! I've only begun watching football since two things happened...

One, my husband explained the rules. If you don't know what a "down" is, the game doesn't make any sense. You won't know why they get four plays to get ten

yards, or why play stops when a player's knee is down. Football was an unintelligible mystery to me for decades, and I couldn't get why it was such a big deal to people.

Two, our older son got interested in football after playing it in high school gym class. He had grown up in Malaysia and had never watched or played football. In gym class, he was like Forrest Gump: he could catch, and he could run, but he didn't know which end zone to aim for. His team literally had to point the way so he wouldn't score for the other team. Now he gets the Madden computer game every December and over the holiday we watched a lot of football together. (Go University of Akron Zips! Go Birds!)

Now football is a part of our household. And of course when something is important enough to bring a family together, it can also be applied to something as important as our faith. So ...

One, the things of faith can seem unintelligible to people who feel outside of it. Like knowing what a "down" is in football, we can teach others what faith is, or grace, or who God is as Creator, Savior, and Friend. Things about Church that bring us joy and meaning in life might give others understanding of their life and what it means to be loved by God and by neighbor.

Two, it took a community to get Dante and me interested in football. For someone to become passionate about something, they need a community around them. We are that community for each other, and for those near us. We are the gathering place, not to see a game, but to see what God is doing among us and through us. Communities are really good at pointing the way to their sports teams or favorite restaurants – to the gathering places. We need to be creative and passionate about pointing people to God's law and God's love.

I still feel a little ambivalent about football – it's a sport that puts bodies and brains in significant danger. (Watch the 2013 movie Concussion to see what I mean.) And plenty of people feel ambivalent about Church – about it's history (dark moments of colonization, racism, and scandals that were hidden rather than healed), about what the heck communion is (cannibalism?, people ask), about why so many Christians seem to be all talk. The Church isn't perfect, and doesn't claim to be. We need to keep having conversations about the things that make us squirm, so that we can make changes that will bless our gathering and all the people that we seek to reach.

Whether you watch the Superbowl and/or the Puppy Bowl (my favorite part!), please join us in our "Souper-bowl of Caring" on February 9. Bring a can of soup or other food pantry donations so that we can help others be blessed by our passionate faith and our loving Church!

Support Committee-Giving With Grace

In the last episode we discussed the gift of <u>Appreciated Securities</u>. Gifts of appreciated Securities enjoy a double tax bonus, that of an immediate charitable deduction, and avoidance of capital gains. Let's move on to....

Tangible Personal Property :

Property can be classified as Real or Personal. Real property is land, buildings and anything that is permanently attached to those buildings. Personal property then is everything else that we own. Tangible as opposed to intangible property is that which we can touch. (We have already discussed intangible assets in our discussion about Appreciated Securities.)

Antiques, rare books, prized collections of art or baseball cards are some of the items of personal property that can be given to Grace. From the sublime to the ridiculous, any gift that can be valued, can be gifted. When the gift is valued the **Fair Market Value** of the gift is deductible as a charitable gift. It would be your job to provide the valuation; but once established, that is the value of your charitable gift deduction. **Fair Market Value** as defined by the Internal Revenue Tax Code is "a willing buyer and a willing seller, neither the buyer or the seller being under any compulsion to buy or sell, exchange assets." The point is not to find a buyer but only establish the value for which the item would sell, if offered.

As with all tax and investment advice, before you adopt any strategy outlined in these discussions, you should consult your own tax and financial advisors as to how the strategy fits into your own situation.
