Dear Friends,

I am weary and my heart is heavy. I look around our state, our country, and our world to see we are unsettled by many things. COVID19 has kept us from our regular routines for many weeks, including gathering for in person church activities. We have lost over 100,000 people to this virus (over 11,500 people have died in NJ alone). Unemployment has skyrocketed and lines at food distribution sites have grown exponentially. Justified anger over the murder of Mr. George Floyd has given rise to demonstrations calling for dismantling racist systems. In the wake of these protests, people seeking opportunity to wreak havoc on communities have destroyed businesses through vandalism and looting. There is much to grieve right now.

While our efforts to change the causes of our distress may seem small, we can respond and act in ways that positively contribute to the common good. We can begin by praying for and with each other – for those who are sick, unemployed, grieving, and oppressed; for those in medical professions, first line responders, police officers, and community organizers; for parents, grandparents, teachers, and caregivers; for those against whom we harbor hatred and for those we love; for those in national, state, and local governments; for all whom Christ died; for peace.

I am increasingly concerned about the ways we have divided ourselves over these issues. At a time when we need to come together, we are instead coming apart. Recommendations about how best to contain the spread of COVID19 are followed or challenged along partisan political lines. We are seeing an easing of restrictions in NJ which means local decisions about indoor, in-person worship will need to be made thoughtfully based on what is most advisable for your context (your building, population, capacity for safety measures).

Similarly, reactions in the aftermath of Mr. Floyd's death have given rise to false dichotomies – either you work toward eradicating racism or you support law enforcement personnel; either you support the protests or you denounce vandalism and destruction. As Lutheran Christians, we live in the tension of an "either/or" world with a "both/and" response all the time. We are both saint and sinner at the same time. We need both law and gospel in our proclamation. So it is that we can work toward eradicating racism and support the vocation of police officers. We can support protests for justice and denounce the destruction of local businesses.

In an ELCA Social Message on Community Violence, we read:

"According to Lutheran theology, society is to be ruled by the civil use of the Law. Government is responsible under God for the protection of its citizens and the maintenance of justice and public order. Just laws and their proper enforcement by police and courts are necessary to restrain violence. But laws and their enforcement are often corrupted by sin. As citizens in a democracy, we have the responsibility to join with others to hold government accountable for protecting society and ensuring justice for all, and to seek changes in policies and practices toward these ends."

Holding these seemingly opposite actions together requires work on our part – building relationships with each other across what's comfortable. And that is only possible because God established a relationship with us in our baptism. Connected through the life-giving waters of baptism, we can listen to our siblings in Christ who cry out for justice and those called to carry out that justice. Bathed in the same waters of life, we can join those who march for change and echo the words of Mr. Terrence Floyd (George Floyd's younger brother) to stop tearing up the community². As one family in Christ, we can come together even as we hold differing opinions on how to live out our faith.

Indeed, there is much to grieve right now: death, sickness, injustice, prejudice, violence – all cause tears to flow down our faces. But we grieve trusting God will wipe away our tears and make all things new. I pray for that day to come soon. In the meantime, I invite you to join me in witnessing to our faith by:

Praying with our synod at noon every day.

Working for justice and peace in all the earth by engaging your congregation in some form of anti-racism education through a bible study, a small-group dialogue, or a book club. See the list of resources on our website.

Loving all people following the example of our Lord, Jesus Christ – especially those most difficult to love.

Recognizing those who carry out their vocation to serve and protect their communities with integrity while working with them to demand transformation of unjust systems.

Thanking essential workers who haven't been able to stay at home, including healthcare professionals, delivery and postal workers, janitorial staff, trash collectors, and restaurant employees.

Thank you for being God's hands and heart at work in the world!

We met on 5/25/2020 to lay out a plan of reopening the church facility. Below are the guidelines we will follow for possible opening as soon as State of NJ Governor Murphy rescinds executive order 107. When this happens, we would like to be ready.

Our capacity is 250 including the sanctuary and side hall. -25% is 50 people.

- 1. DIRECTIONS FOR ENTERING CHURCH ARE TO BE GIVEN TO USE SIDE ISLES TO ENTER AND FILL THE CHURCH FROM FRONT TO BACK
- 2. DIRECTIONS FOR LEAVING CHURCH WILL BE FROM BACK TO FRONT AND ALTERNATING SIDES TO FILE OUT SO THERE IS NOT A LINE AT THE DOOR. PLEASE LIMIT YOUR INTERACTIONS WITH ANY MEMBER WHO IS NOT MASKED.
- 3. Masks must be worn while entering or leaving the building.
- 4. One family per pew, no more that 2 single persons per pew at opposite sides.
- 5. THE BULLETIN WILL INCLUDE SERVICE AND MUSIC TO AVOID HANDLING OF HYMNS. PLEASE PICK-UP YOUR BULLETIN AS YOU ENTER THE SANCTUARY. BULLETINS WILL NOT BE HANDED OUT BY USHERS.
- 6. Parishioners will be asked to take the bulletins with them (and any trash) to avoid handling by others. Ushers will not be cleaning the pews.
- 7. COLLECTION PLATES WILL BE PLACED AT THE ENTRANCES TO THE SANCTUARY AND THE SOCIAL HALL AND WILL NOT BE PASSED TO PARISHIONERS BY AN USHER.
- 8. Church will be cleaned by Service Master using recommended CDC/DOH guidelines (fog) for the downstairs area / pantry, kitchen and sanctuary prior to reopening. Support team and Council approved, they will be contacted once we have an official date.
- 9. Hand sanitizer stations will be/have been purchased to be located -1 free standing unit at narthex of church, 3 wall units by the pantry, by the office door, and the side door to the sanctuary.
- 10. We will utilize the sanctuary and open the doors to the social hall with limited seating.
- 11. We will block every other pew and alternate the blocked pew from side to side.
- 12. Rear and side doors will remain open while people are within the rooms.
- 13. We will place signage with several key points to notify parishioners of the procedures.
- 14. The elevator may be used by 1 person with 1 immediate family member, only if required for assistance.
- 15. Hymnals, bibles, communion cards, and prayer cards will be removed. Any prayer requests should be emailed to the church secretary to be included within the bulletin.
- 16. We will suspend sharing of the peace.

- 17. Communion will be done once per month until safe to commune at the rail.
- 18. We have single serve communion cups (wafer and juice [no wine] individually wrapped)₈ When communion takes place, each parishioner will take a cup as they enter the sanctuary.
- 19. We have postponed coffee fellowship until safe to resume closer proximity.
- 20. Scott Breiner will try to incorporate solos, duets, small groups for choir to actively lead our music program.
- 21. Choir members will need to be distanced as well as parishioners, six feet between non family members. we will reserve the first set of pews for additional choir members.
- 22. The current pre-recorded service will stop and a video of the actual service will be done and posted on the website and Facebook by Sunday afternoon for those who can not make it to church. (we believe this will work but have patience with us if it does not)
- 23. We will have only one service at 10:15 am. No early service is possible because several rooms will not be in use.
- 24. Counting teams will require masks and gloves to complete the deposits.
- 25. Outside groups may restart their meetings two (2) weeks after our reopening.
 - onew agreements must be completed prior to the first meeting, please contact Diana to obtain the paperwork
 - how agreements will detail social distancing requirements
- 26. Any person that has entered our building for any use (worship or group meetings) that then has a report of positive COVID will be required to contact the church office or group leader to advise. A cleaning will then be ordered for the areas that may have been involved.
- 27. Worship at your own risk. If you feel uncomfortable about attending church services, or group meetings, we understand. we want to keep you safe and keep us safe.
- 28. Please use the bathrooms in the Social Hall during worship services.
- 29. Wash your hands when you get home.
